Extremism is

- Extremist a person who holds extreme political or religious views
- Problems that arise when views lead to dangerous / criminal behaviour or incitement to hatred
- Most people who believe in a religion, a political or animal rights cause are **not** extremists however such causes have sometimes attract extremists who <u>have</u> resorted to violence and intimidation.
- Extremists operate either as organised groups or 'lone wolves.'

Within organised groups, extremists often target vulnerable people who they feel they can manipulate into believing their views.

Lone extremists are often found to be individuals who have struggled to fit into society for a variety of reasons, which leads them to identify with cults or religions that have extreme views.

So What does an Extremist look like?

Extremists do not have a particular 'look'.

They also <u>do not</u> belong to just one particular race or a religion!

Unfortunately, Extremists people of all different ages, races, religions etc..

As British Citizens, we must be aware of signs of extremism & <u>do</u> <u>not</u> be afraid to report <u>any</u> concerns to Professionals.



Prevent is part of the Government's counterterrorist strategy known as CONTEST.

CONTEST as a counter-terrorism strategy is organised around four work streams, each comprising a number of key objectives:



What is our role within the PREVENT Strategy?

- <u>College / Education providers role</u> = To implement the PREVENT Strategy, train all staff in regards to how to identify signs of Extremism, Radicalisation or Terrorism and also to Safeguard all staff & students.
- <u>Education Professionals role</u> = To Safeguard all staff & students by accepting training in to how to identify signs of Extremism, Radicalisation or Terrorism and also to run Enrichment sessions to educate Students on this topic.
- <u>Students role</u> = To Safeguard themselves, their peers & all staff members by attending sessions on how to Promote British values.
